The **Sacrament of Holy Unction (Anointing of the Sick)** reminds us that when we are in pain—either physical, emotional or spiritual—Christ is present with us through the ministry of His Church. He is among us to offer strength to meet the challenges of life. As is the custom of our parish during Great Lent, this sacrament will be celebrated this year on **Thursday, March 18**, at 7 p.m. After the reading of seven Epistles and Gospels and the offering of seven prayers all devoted to healing, everyone present will be anointed with oil, as a sign of God's mercy and forgiveness. Holy Unction is not an obligatory, but voluntary sacrament. It is good, though, for all Orthodox Christians who are sick in body, mind or spirit to draw near, as it can provide great comfort, spiritual uplifting and the patience to accept the will of God. So, keep the day open and plan to attend. (*NOTE: Those who are not regular communicants must prepare to receive Holy Unction by first going to Holy Confession. If you have any questions, contact Fr. David.*)

On **Saturday, March 20**, our parish will host a **Lenten Food Fair**, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., in the church hall. Lenten foods, arts & crafts and babkas for the holiday will be available for purchase. Much more will be featured, so please watch future bulletins for further details. Today is **Cheesefare Sunday**, the last day to eat eggs and dairy products, such as cheese, butter and milk, as we prepare for the start of Great Lent tomorrow.

Most of us would agree that fasting is hard, whether it is abstaining from food, drink, forms of entertainment and, certainly, from the sinful inclinations of our fallen nature. These things are difficult to keep "in check" everyday, let alone during the Great Fast, which is longer and stricter than any of the other fasting seasons of the year. As hard as we try to live a godly life, the demons are trying that much harder to take us off the path.

We need to remember that fasting is not effective, or even spiritual, if it is an empty physical exercise; it must be accompanied by prayer, almsgiving, repentance, spiritual reading and attendance at church services. True fasting is not meant to be a set of rules making for a dismal life; rather, it frees us from the slavery of sin. The physical fast—abstinence from certain foods and their quantities—goes hand-in-hand with the spiritual fast—shunning sin and passions. We must also remember that it is as important to fast with what comes out of the mouth as well as what goes into it. God does not need our fasting—we need to fast in order to return to a state of communion with Him.

So, whatever fasting discipline you set for yourself, make the best effort possible to stick to it. Focus your mind, soul and body on God, Who is the source of life and joy, fully realized in His glorious Resurrection.

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The beginning of **Great Lent** is, once again, upon us. As we start this time of preparation that will ultimately lead us to the celebration of Pascha, we must take care that we handle the Fast with the right spirit and with proper goals in mind.

Great Lent must be a prayerful time. Some of the most beautiful and meaningful services are found during this 40-day fast. As it unfolds, our prayer life must increase in frequency and intensity. Participating in the devotions prescribed for this sacred season will provide us with a fuller understanding of our Lord's Passion.

Great Lent must be a penitential time. We must use it as the perfect opportunity to imitate the Prodigal Son and *"return to our Father,"* as well. If Christ was willing to die for our sins, we must be willing to express sorrow and contrition for them.

Great Lent must be a positive time. As Christ says in today's Gospel: "When you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, so that you do not appear to men to be fasting." (Matt 6:17) The demands of the Lenten season are not placed upon us to cause us pain and suffering! Indeed, we should rejoice that this wonderful opportunity to draw closer to Jesus is given to us each year by our Holy Orthodox Church.

May God grant all of us a blessed 40 days—days where we can allow Him to work with us, in us and through us to bring about deeper prayer, greater spiritual receptivity through fasting and more perfect love through almsgiving. Only then will His victory over sin and death on Pascha be a time of immeasurable joy for all of us.

## **☞** THE GREAT CANON OF SAINT ANDREW OF CRETE **☞**

The reading of the **Great Canon of Saint Andrew of Crete** is the traditional way to begin the season of Great Lent. It is divided into sections and read, as part of Great Compline, over the first four days of the Fast. It can best be described as a penitential lamentation conveying the scope and depth of sin, shaking the soul with despair, repentance and hope. Saint Andrew uses examples from both the Old and New Testaments in such a beautiful and unique way to emphasize the fallen nature of man. This is further underscored through our heartfelt repetition of the soulful refrain: "Have mercy on me, O God, have mercy on me."

Plan to come to the services this Monday through Thursday; it truly is the perfect way to get you into the mindset of the Fast.

## **∞** THE PRAYER OF SAINT EPHRAIM THE SYRIAN **∞**

he traditional prayer of the Great Lenten season is the **Prayer of Saint Ephraim the Syrian**. It is read at the conclusion of every weekday service during the 40 days, accompanied by repeated prostrations. In its simplicity, this prayer embodies the essence of Lent, in that we pray to God to help rid us of our passions and install virtue in our hearts.

The text of this prayer is as follows:

#### O LORD AND MASTER OF MY LIFE, TAKE FROM ME THE SPIRIT OF SLOTH, DESPAIR, LUST OF POWER AND IDLE TALK. BUT GIVE RATHER THE SPIRIT OF CHASTITY, HUMILITY, PATIENCE AND LOVE TO THY SERVANT. YEA, O LORD AND KING, GRANT ME TO SEE MY OWN TRANSGRESSIONS AND NOT TO JUDGE MY BROTHER, FOR BLESSED ART THOU UNTO AGES OF AGES. AMEN.

You are encouraged to incorporate this prayer into your morning and evening devotions. At the end of each verse, make a prostration (full bow with head to the floor). Following the *Amen*, cross yourself 12 times while bowing your head and saying, "O God, cleanse me a sinner." Then repeat the entire prayer and prostrate yourself one final time.

May these blessed words help you each day of your Lenten journey.

### **★ CONFESSION & COMMUNION DURING GREAT LENT ★**

- To make your participation in the sacraments of Holy Confession & Communion more meaningful this Great Lent, you are asked to adhere to the following guidelines and schedule:
- General Confession will NOT be held. Those who have been communing regularly may continue to approach the Chalice; however, everyone must come to individual confession sometime during the Fast.
- The confessing of Church School Children will take place on the First Saturday of Lent, February 20, at 5 p.m. The youth will commune as a group during Liturgy on the Sunday of Orthodoxy, February 21. Afterwards, the St. Anne's Guild will host a Communion Breakfast for all parishioners.
- Everyone is encouraged to confess before or after attending worship services on the evening **prior** to the day he/she wishes to commune.
- Make sure you completely fill out a *Confession Card* before giving it to Fr. David; this will help update parish records.
- Consider making an offering to charity as you go to Confession; be generous from the heart **and** wallet to those in need.
- Confessions will be held:

Wednesday evenings from 6-6:45 p.m. and Friday mornings from 8-8:45 a.m., preceding the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts;

Friday evenings from 6-7 p.m. and following the Lenten service; Saturday mornings at 8 a.m. (*Please do not arrive later than 8:30 a.m.*); and Saturday evenings from 5-6:30 p.m. and following Vespers.

- > There will be **NO CONFESSIONS** at all on Sunday mornings, unless pre-arranged with Fr. David.
- > The confessing and communing of our shut-ins and nursing home residents will be scheduled later in the Lenten season.

As you can see, there will be many opportunities throughout this period to look at yourself honestly and confess those things that have been weighing on your mind. Don't **put off** going to Confession until the last minute! By so doing, you are depriving yourself of a much richer Lent—indeed, a much richer life. If it's been too long since the last time you sought the direct, personal forgiveness of Christ made tangible in this sacrament, it will only get more difficult because of your procrastination. You are urged to make your Lenten confession early, especially during these first few weeks of the Fast. In that way, the richness of God's mercy may develop the full root and stem to blossom into a hardy and brilliant Paschal joy.
