The **Installation of the 2010 Parish Council** will take place on **Sunday**, **March 14**, at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy. The new Council's first meeting will be held on **Monday**, **March 15**, at 7 p.m., in the church hall.

When one is ill, it can, very often, be a time when one feels alone and isolated. The **Sacrament of Holy Unction** (**Anointing of the Sick**) reminds us that when we are in pain—be it physical, emotional and/or spiritual—Christ is present with us through the ministry of His Church. He is among us to offer strength to meet the challenges of life. As is the custom of our parish during Great Lent, this sacrament will be celebrated this year on **Thursday, March 18**, at 7 p.m. After the reading of seven Epistles and Gospels and the offering of seven prayers all devoted to healing, everyone present will be anointed with oil, as a sign of God's mercy and forgiveness. Holy Unction is not an obligatory, but voluntary sacrament. It is very good, though, for all Orthodox Christians who are sick in body, mind or spirit to draw near, as it can provide great comfort, spiritual uplifting and the patience to accept the will of the Lord. So, keep the day open and plan to attend. (<u>NOTE</u>: Those who are not regular communicants must prepare to receive Holy Unction by first going to Holy Confession. If you have any questions, contact Fr. David.)

MEMORIAL (SOUL) SATURDAYS are days set aside, throughout the year, for commemoration of the dead. Within the Church, Saturday is a traditional day of prayer for the deceased, because Christ lay dead in the tomb on Saturday. Memorial Saturdays are devoted to remembering departed relatives and others among the faithful who have fallen asleep in the Lord. This year's Lenten Soul Saturdays will be March 6 & 13. The Liturgy on these days will be preceded by Matins for the Departed on Friday evening. A form to list the names of those you want mentioned at these services was included in the January 17 bulletin; if you didn't get one, there are extra copies available at the Candle Desk. Once completed, you can either drop it off in church or send it to the rectory. As Orthodox Christians, we should never neglect our responsibility of praying for the dead, for remembering them is a sign of our deep love for the Church Triumphant. In response to our heartfelt petitions, our Lord will, in turn, show His mercy upon our departed loved ones and us. Attend these services and you will be richly blessed!

▼ THE DIVINE LITURGY OF ST. BASIL THE GREAT ▼

n all the Sundays of Great Lent, as well as on Thursday and Saturday of Holy Week, the more solemn and penitential **Divine** Liturgy of St. Basil the Great is served. It differs very little from the *Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom;* the primary differences are the priest's prayers during the *Anaphora* (Eucharistic Prayers), a variant *Hymn to the Theotokos* and the *Prayer of Thanksgiving* following Holy Communion. All are especially beautiful and rich in theology, praising God and remembering the wonderful gifts He has given us and the salvation-granting actions He has performed. Check the *Table of Contents* of the Liturgy prayer books in the pews to find the appropriate pages. Try to pay attention and reflect on the many aspects of our relationship with God that they talk about.

* THE LITURGY OF THE PRESANCTIFIED GIFTS *

The Divine Liturgy, being the banquet of Christ, is a festive, joyous and triumphant celebration. With the exception of the Feast of the Annunciation, the Church does not permit such a celebration on weekdays (Monday to Friday) during Great Lent, as this is a period of penitence and mourning for sin, the remembrance of fallen Adam and of the whole creation with him and the recollection of our slavery to the enemy of salvation.

In order to allow the faithful to participate in Holy Communion, Saint Gregory the Great created the *Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts*, a Vespers service at which worshippers commune of the Holy Gifts that were consecrated on the previous Sunday. It is traditionally celebrated on Wednesday and Friday evenings, although there are some churches that will serve it in the morning. As communicants, we are instructed to fast all day long or, at a bare minimum, from noon on.

This liturgy truly captures the meaning and essence of the season. Please make every effort to attend. There is no doubt that it will deepen your spiritual vision and give you the strength to "fight the good fight" and reach the great and glorious day of Pascha.

(Besides special music, a unique feature of the Presanctified Liturgy is the profound signs of reverence and repentance, i.e., prostrations and kneeling. In order of the service, a prostration is done before the second Old Testament reading, when the priest brings out a lighted candle and the censor from the Holy Altar and blesses the faithful with the words, "Wisdom! Let us attend! The Light of Christ illumines all men!" During the singing of "Let My Prayer Arise..." the faithful kneel, after which the Prayer of Saint Ephraim is recited with prostrations. Another prostration is done during the Great Entrance. Saint Ephraim's Prayer is again repeated with prostrations. Finally, kneeling takes place during the Lord's Prayer.)
