∞ CHURCH ORDER FOR HOLY WEEK **∞**

- Please be attentive when holding candles during the Holy Week and Paschal services, so as to avoid setting hair, clothes or prayer books on fire or dripping wax on the pews, floor or carpet.
- Everyone should take part in the processions on Good Friday and Pascha night by carrying candles and maintaining "holy silence."
- Shortly before the start of the Resurrection Matins, all the candles and lights in the church will be put out. Until the Paschal candle is brought from the Holy Altar to the ambo where two lay people will receive the light and pass it on to the entire congregation, please try not to move about in the dark.
- Following the Lamentations & Matins on Good Friday evening, April 2, the church will keep watch (vigil) over the tomb of Jesus Christ until the start of Nocturne on Holy Saturday, April 3. The Book of Psalms will be read all through the night. You are encouraged to sign-up for a two-hour shift and join in with your family or friends. A sheet is posted on the bulletin board in the church vestibule. Everyone, both young and old, should participate in this memorial to our Crucified Lord. Volunteers are particularly needed on Saturday afternoon and evening. For more information, contact Gregory Sprogis at (732) 254-6167.
- Volunteers are still needed to carry icons and banners during the processions on Good Friday evening, Pascha night, Easter Sunday afternoon (Paschal Vespers) and Bright Monday. Anyone and everyone can take part! If you're interested, see Gregory Sprogis. [NOTE: Assistance with moving the tomb and putting the tetrapod back in the center of the church on Pascha night would also be appreciated.]
- Those desiring to read the Acts of the Apostles before the Holy Plaschanitsa on Holy Saturday, April 3, should get in touch with Father David before the end of the week; start time is 8 p.m.

BLESSING OF PASCHAL (EASTER) FOOD H

Pascha is a day without parallel in the Orthodox Church. The Resurrection of Christ is the central mystery of our faith and we joyfully celebrate it in soul **and** body. Part of our celebration is the enduring rite of bringing a basket of food to church to be blessed. The foods in the basket are those that were not eaten during Great Lent: meats, eggs, cheese and butter. The "forbidden" foods of the Fast become the foods of the Feast.

This blessing also recognizes that food has an important place in the Resurrection. Proving that He was truly risen and not a ghost, Jesus asked for something to eat on Pascha night. He also ate with the disciples on other occasions during the 40 days after His rising from the dead.

Although food that is prepared for Easter is usually blessed after services on Pascha night, our parish will also bless baskets on **Holy Saturday**, **April 3**, at **4 p.m.**, in the church hall. Please remember, however, that as tempting as it may be, **none** of this food is to be eaten until next Sunday; only **Lenten** foods are in order on Saturday. We break the Fast and begin the Feast by partaking of Communion at the Paschal Liturgy; then we celebrate the new life of the holiday with the great sights and smells of wonderful food.

(<u>NOTE</u>: NO food or drink should be brought into the church, especially if you plan to venerate the Holy Plaschanitsa before or after the 4 p.m. basket blessing on Holy Saturday. Blessed or unblessed, food should remain **outside**, in the hall or in your car. Just as Jesus drove out the moneychangers for making His house of prayer into a den of thieves, we should not treat our place of worship like a marketplace. Your attention to this matter will be appreciated.)
